

Minutes of the Monthly Executive Meeting RASC Saskatoon Centre Monday, June 20, 2022 - 7:00 pm - Online (ZOOM)

Attending: Donna-Lee May, Les Dickson, Rick Huziak, Ron Waldron, Darrell Chatfield, Tenho Tuomi, Jeff Swick, Mark de Jong, Colin Chatfield, Patricia Gakis, Grant Ursaki, Jim Wood.

- 1. Call to order 7:01 pm Donna-Lee May.
- 2. **Approval of the May Executive Minutes** as circulated in the June newsletter. **Moved**: Donna-Lee May. **Seconded**: Ron Waldron. **Carried.**
- 3. Call for additional announcements/items to add to agenda 16" Telescope recommendations moved to after the Financial Report in the agenda.

4. Old business/ Committee reports

- **Insurance claim** update for Sleaford shed break-in—Darrell Chatfield Approval June 7 to get shed fixed. June 14 COOP was contacted to order new door. COOP will be contracted to rebuild the shed.
- Access and fixes to Sleaford shed Darrell Chatfield Could be accessed removing the plywood. On June 11 a small crew went out. Mike Dolan attempted to repair the riding mower throttle cable. The riding mower needs carburetor servicing. Grass was cut by Larry Scott. Push mowers to be transported for service by Mini-tune for 3-year maintenance.
- **Purchase of replacement snow blower** Darrell Chatfield tabled to future meeting no quote yet. Insurance offering \$2700 (We have a \$1000 deductible on our policy covering the entire claim).
- **Any maintenance at Sleaford this summer**? Darrell Chatfield Washroom floor still needs fixing. Give Donna-Lee an estimate if new work needs to be done.
- Rekeying of Sleaford Darrell Chatfield (looking for budget/quote) approximately \$400. Darrell can do but might needs some professional rekeying services. Tabled until Sept.
- Power plug upgrades at Sleaford (off of Roll-off) Darrell Chatfield (budget?) approximately \$400. Darrell can do. Tabled until Sept.
- Password protected website. has been created by Andrew Kostiuk comments deferred.
- **Centre Bylaws** Les Dickson will review the state of bylaws and update the Bylaw Committee. Online bylaws do not reflect recent changes to National governance. Les will organize a meeting of the Committee over the summer.
- **Provincial registration status** Donna-Lee May Donna-Lee has contacted and is arguing regarding timing of payment, since they had payment before the registration was suspended. Province is reviewing.
- **Telescope Loaner Report** Ike Thiessen has submitted a report (which is not part if these minutes) and \$100 rental cash.
- Discussion on Criminal Records Checks (CRCs) for members Donna-Lee May. National (with respect to their insurance requirements) highly recommends CRCs. Les Dickson, Donna-Lee May, Patricia Gakis and Rick Huziak will get CRCs to lead the new procedure. Motion by Rick Huziak: That the Centre develops a procedure to have

outreach members obtain CRCs and that members who will do outreach will have a CRC. **Seconded:** Les Dickson. **CARRIED.**

- Conflicts of Interest Les Dickson will find out if our policy needs to align with National policy. Les asked National but they do not have a specific policy. A recommendation by Mike Watson (National 2nd VP, RASC legal advisor) would have to be in line with Provincial laws. Les suggests we have a draft procedure by the September meeting.
- Reminder that **original receipts are necessary for reimbursement** of expenses Donna-Lee May.

5. New business

- **Resignation of Tim Yaworski as Activities Coordinator** Donna-Lee May. Donna-Lee thanked Tim for his service.
- Acceptance of Patty Gakis as Activities Coordinator Donna-Lee May. Motion by Donna-Lee: Patty Gakis becomes the interim Activities Coordinator until the October elections. Seconded: Rick Huziak. CARRIED.
- **Sleaford Open House date** Patty Gakis Date needs still to be chosen.
- Saskatoon Radio Club Amateur Radio Day in the Park at Meewasin Park on July 3. RASC to do solar observing in conjunction with the Radio Club Patty Gakis.
- **Social Media** review Patty Gakis: Facebook is being handled by Colin Chatfield.
- Patty Gakis requests the current **Instagram account** that refers to the RASC be closed and it be reopened by Colin and Patty to better represent the RASC. Colin & Patty will meet.
- Needs new signing authority for cheques Donna-Lee May. Motion: Donna-Lee Moved that Les Dickson be our 3rd signing authority to replace Mike Dolan. Seconded: Ron Waldron. CARRIED.
- **Need Chair volunteer for September meeting** Donna-Lee May Les Dickson volunteers to chair the September meeting. (Rick Huziak has already agreed to do the October meeting.)
- **Assets list to be updated & valued** Donna-Lee May Members asked to report any assets. Donna-Lee will accumulate the list and properly value the assets with depreciation as required.

- **Treasurer's Report report on cash-flow** Donna-Lee May. Donna-Lee reported the quarterly statement. Note the Centre may show a deficit of approximately \$3100 for 2022 if the club does not find a way to raise funds or reduce expenses. The club currently runs at a deficit of approx. \$2000/year.


- **SSSP update** Rick Huziak. SSSP is on track for a normal star party of approximately 320 participants. Full programming is being scheduled.



Insurance Claim

I'm expecting the double door system to arrive at the Co-op by next week. At such time, the guy contracted to rebuild the damaged shed corner will be able to do the necessary repairs. The advantage is that he works for the Co-op and lives not far from Sleaford itself, so the repairs will be easier to facilitate.

Riding Mower

On June 11th, Mike Dolan and his mechanic friend went out to Sleaford with a new throttle cable, which they installed. However, a new situation arose whereby the mower would not stay running with the new cable. The mechanic friend determined that the carburetor was gummed up, and would need rebuilding. I talked with Mini-tune about that, and they said we could just remove the carburetor from the machine, and bring that in for servicing.

So I should be able to do that, after a bit more consultation with Mini-Tune. Larry also went out on the same day, and cut the important grass areas with our self-propelled mower. He then brought in the 2 hand mowers for their tri-annual servicing to Mini-tune. Larry also went out on June 25th to take the mowers back to Sleaford, and also cut the grass again.

- Nag everyone to show up.



ABOUT YXE CENTRE - CALL FOR PARTICIPATION

Rick Huziak (Secretary), Donna-Lee May (Treasurer), Les Dickson (National Rep.)

As the interim Executive of the Saskatoon Centre, we figure we should talk about a few things that the Centre needs to consider to be sustainable and productive. Please read this and start a conversation, and in the fall, please consider participating more in the Centre governance and activities. The Centre only exists through its membership and the degree to which it thrives is directly related to active participation of its Executive Council backed by the enthusiastic support of its members. In the last six months, we've had to pull double duty with running the affairs of the Centre and organizing the Saskatchewan Summer Star Party. We are requesting that other Centre members step up into Centre leadership positions in the fall. You might infer by reading the June Executive Minutes that we have many issues we need to work through for the Centre. They have been accumulating. All issues do not have to be resolved right now, but we need to be cognizant of how each issue affects our operations

Governance - For much of the last decade, we've had a poor succession model for our President and Vice-president positions mostly driven by the lack of volunteers for those positions and our acceptance that it might be okay to operate without a Vice-president. (Thank you to our recent leaders who have braved our lack of support in backfilling the VP vacancy, but we appreciate the jobs you have collectively done despite this). In most organizations, normal succession is for the Vice-president to be a training position and an assistant to the President, and that on the vacancy of the presidency, the VP assumes that position and a new VP is elected. Of course, all positions are free to be elected under our constitution, so succession of VP to President doesn't always happen this way, but it is the usual norm and this produces strong continuity in the Centre. The Presidential and Vicepresidential positions are two-year terms to further ensure continuity since a single year seems to go by very quickly. Currently, the Centre is operating without a sitting President and Vice-president and will do so until the October annual elections. This is not a good situation. Meetings and programming have continued. Donna-Lee did an excellent job of chairing the overflowing June Executive meeting. Les will chair the September meeting, and Rick will chair the October AGM and elections.

Technically, the Executive of the Centre consists of the President, Vice-president, Secretary and Treasurer (and a Board of Directors) as far as the National RASC and the Government of Saskatchewan are concerned. There are, however, several other Executive support positions (Newsletter Editor, Social Media Coordinator, Librarian, etc.) and committees defined, and it needs to be clarified (by the future Executive) as to who has or does not have voting rights for different decisions. We will leave this discussion, and many others (some of which are indicate below) for the future Executive committee.

October's Elections – An official *Notice of the October Annual General Meeting* of the Saskatoon Centre will be given in the September newsletter, but we are going to provide pre-notice at this time. We need to fill the positions of President and Vice-President.

As of the November meeting, the new Executive will need to be able to run the affairs of the Centre. You can be assured that the new Executive will be provide with support from past Executive members as they need, and that there is a developing *Executive Handbook* available to provide long term guidance.

Membership, Growth & Sustainability – Maybe it is a *Sign of the Internet Times* but membership numbers in the Saskatoon RASC (and many other clubs) have remained stagnant over the last decade with around 88 members annually. It doesn't have to be that way. A part of doing public outreach is to raise enough interest in the Centre that people want to join and contribute. Our Centre has a lot to offer and growing beyond the status quo is the way to introduce new ideas and make the Centre financially solid. With inflation, costs have grown, but the number of contributing memberships has not.

Membership Fees – Due to several factors, the National RASC voted at the 2022 General Assembly to increase membership fees, or better stated, to increase the portion of fees that go to support National programs. So annual memberships increase for the Centre but the amount of cash the Saskatoon Centre sees does not increase. This is all the better reason to have a sustainability plan and to grow the membership base. Our hope is that increased membership fees do not have the negative effect of reducing membership numbers from perceived lack of bang for the buck.

Cashflow (and Fundraising) – The Treasurer's review of income, cash on hand and investments the Centre has verses the expenses the Centre incurs annually shows that we have not been keeping up with inflation (from several sources), that we are overspending and that we are in a negative cashflow situation. We spend more annually than we bring in. (The annual financial report is available to members on request but is no longer published in the newsletter due to security concerns). This means that a further financial review should identify expenses that we can reduce or eliminate, and we need to identify opportunities for the Centre to raise cash on an ongoing basis. Methods of fundraising may be not to do certain outreach activities for free, to solicit donations, to sell surplus assets (temporary relief) or to do other creative projects. What is certain is that the negative cashflow needs to be curbed.

Outreach – The basic purpose of outreach should be to raise awareness of astronomy *in a manner that benefits the Centre*. Some benefits may be to generate income, increase membership (which increases income and enthusiasm) or to foster future opportunities that benefit the Centre, such as representing the Centre as the local experts for astronomy that can then translate into the above future benefits.

Understanding Insurance and Liability within Outreach Activities – Because outreach activities reflect on the Centre and carry both insurance and liability implications, all public outreach activities that Centre is directly providing must be approved by the Centre Executive and must be backed by an insurance certificate. Somewhat strangely, this seemed to be a controversial issue recently. However, our Centre insurer has required this practice for at least a decade. The likely misunderstanding would be based on poor communication between the Executive and Outreach Coordinators and the lack of clear policy. This sounds a bit bureaucratic, but it really doesn't have to be. When the Centre is hosting public activities, this opens the Centre, it's participating members and the Executive members up to a certain amount of risk and possible litigation if an injury or a mishap occurs during the event. Centres being sued is not unheard of, and this has occurred with at least two RASC Centre events in Canada in recent times. To mitigate risk, the Centre carries a \$2-million local insurance policy that insures Centre members, Centre assets and the event against such issues. Furthermore, the National RASC also provides a \$2-million policy that covers liability for the Centre membership (though not equipment insurance). However, these policies only come into play if the outreach activities are approved on advance and that an insurance certificate is issued for the event in advance. So, the Executive must be advised in advance of the event, must evaluate if the event could produce any extraordinary liability and the Treasurer would then arrange for a proper insurance certificate. Even with a "pop-up" outreach event, this is easily possible with a few days' notice and can be done over email. So, as bureaucratic as it may sound, this process assures the Centre is aware and that it is protected – all in just a few days. Before the onset of COVID-19, we regularly had certificates in place for all outreach activities and we need to continue this practice now.

It should be noted that it is also very important that those who are running outreach activities (best done through the Outreach Coordinator) have the authority to represent the Centre. For example, a member doing a private star party for friends or the public on their block or a talk to a group is not by default covered by RASC insurance, and they should not represent themselves or the event as an official RASC event. However, with preapproval, such an event could be covered by the RASC.

Constitution & Handbooks - Our Centre lacks a current constitution. To rectify this, we have appointed a Constitution Committee. Most of this delay of a modern constitution results from two major governance model changes to ENGOs imposed first by the Federal government, then by two completely revised new governance models over the last decade by the National RASC. The lack of a constitution (required of all registered organizations) throws some kinks in our daily governance, and there is a bit of confusion at time as to what we can or can't do. This constitution should form the basis for a *Centre Handbook* that can be referenced by members, but also there has been a rumour (just about forever) that *National* is developing a model handbook for Centres. We haven't seen this handbook yet, and we haven't previously had the resources to pre-empt their effort, so we haven't updated our 25-year-old *Saskatoon Centre Handbook*. It would great to have this handy.

The updated constitution will also address issues of *Conflict of Interest* to clarify what may be in conflict when members vote, propose projects, or conduct outreach. Situation conflicts may arise that affect our liability, insurance, and ethical operations of the Centre. We do, however, have an *Executive Handbook* that is very useful for the Executive to keep track of the things we need to know at a moment's notice when making governance decisions, and things we need to keep track of through the years (such as Sleaford holders, our asset list, etc).

Sleaford Observatory – The Sleaford Observatory storage shed had a break-in this winter and the snow blower was stolen. Whomever decided they would break in drove the rear of their pick-up truck through the double steel doors causing extensive damage. The shed damage and snowblower were covered by our insurance premium (after the deductible) and the shed damage will be repaired shortly allowing for returned normal use of the observatory. Note that normal use also requires ongoing grass cutting and snow clearing. We are still looking for volunteers Sleaford Coordinators who would become responsible for coordinating such tasks over the year.
